

11. On shorter sides, when starting, fold over small bit of binding before starting to pin. Then pin that piece flush with the edge of the other binding; otherwise, following previous steps. (picture)

12. When reaching the far edge, repeat by cutting off excess fabric leaving approximately ½ inch for folding and sewing down. (picture)

13. Then turn quilt over and follow previous steps.

14. At each of the four corners on the sides, there will be a space between the front and back of the top and bottom (short) binding strips. This should be secured by whip stitching the front and back together. (picture)

**REMEMBER TO NOT SHOW KNOTS--BURY YOUR KNOTS WHEN STARTING AND WHEN FINISHING.**

19<sup>th</sup> Century binding lies flatter and uses approximately ½ as much fabric as today. The finished quilt will NOT have mitered corners; but that is the 19<sup>th</sup> Century look.
